Best Practice 05: Issuance of Certificate for Non-Forest Land

Overview

The **Issuance of Certificate for Non-Forest Land** is a best practice implemented by the **Forest Department** of Madhya Pradesh. Officially launched on **October 23, 2020**, this reform aims to simplify and digitize the process of obtaining certificates for land parcels that do not fall under the eco-sensitive zone or come under the purview of forest land. The system is accessible via the online portal https://mpforest.gov.in/forestnoc/index.html.

Pre-Reform Scenario

Prior to the implementation of this reform, the process for obtaining a Certificate for Non-Forest Land was entirely offline. Applicants were required to visit multiple offices, including Forest, Revenue, and Town and Country Planning (T&CP), to obtain the necessary consents. This process was cumbersome and time-consuming, leading to delays and frustration for applicants.

Objective

The primary objective of the best practice is to streamline the process for the issuance of Non-Forest Certificates through an online system. This system is designed to facilitate applications for land parcels that do not fall under eco-sensitive zones, thereby improving efficiency and reducing the burden on applicants.

Implementation

The **GIS-based system** was developed for the issuance of Non-Forest No Objection Certificates (NOCs). The system verifies the **Khasra** details of the respective NOC applications and issues the NOC through the developed platform. Users can download their NOC Certificates directly from the system. Additionally, the department has a module to view NOC applications and manually mark the status for buffer land. The system also generates Rejection Certificates or forwards applications to the **Divisional Forest Officer (DFO)** as per the specific case.

Key Features

- **Digitization**: The entire process has been digitized, moving from an offline to an online format, significantly simplifying the procedure.
- **Simplification**: The new system streamlines the steps required to obtain a Certificate, reducing complexity and enhancing user experience.

Impact

The implementation of the system has significantly reduced the number of procedures and documents required for obtaining a Certificate. As of now, more than **6,536 applications** have been approved through the system. The process is now governed by the **Public Service Guarantee Act**, with a defined service timeline of **15 days**. The new system has also minimized the delay costs incurred by users, as it eliminates the need for multiple visits to departmental offices.

Replicability

This reform is replicable across other ministries and states/UTs. Officers are encouraged to exercise discretion in identifying the viability of replicating this reform in different contexts.
